## MIDDLE SCHOOL PROMOTION REQUIREMENTS

- WCPSS Policy 5530 requires grade-level proficiency in reading and mathematics in order to be promoted to the next grade level in grades 6-8. To be promoted, students must test proficiency standards and receive a passing grade (D or better) in:
- Language Arts,
- Mathematics,
- Social Studies or Science,
- Half of all remaining courses taken.


## DAILY MIDDLE SCHOOL SCHEDULE

Beginning in $6^{\text {th }}$ grade we prepare students to enter our early college setting by junior year. Students take language arts and math daily for the entire year and take science and social studies for a semester. PE and middle school electives are taken on an A/B day schedule.
Every student engages in a required 25-minute Girls Leadership Class. In middle school, we strive to prepare each girl for success in her transition to honors level classes in our high school.

## HIGH SCHOOL ELECTIVES: $9^{T H}$ AND $10^{\text {TH }}$ GRADES

- Students will have the opportunity to rank electives that they are most interested in taking, and we will offer selections based on their interests. All $9^{\text {th }}$ and $10^{\text {th }}$ graders will take Healthful Living if we are able to hire a teacher.

## RISING JUNIOR AND SENIOR REGISTRATION

- Rising juniors and seniors will meet individually with Mrs. di Carlo in March and April to complete course registration.
- Students will always take a combination of high school and college courses.
- College course load will depend in academic progress, maturity, teacher recommendations and student and parent input. College course load can increase with student success.
- Some college courses fulfill high school graduation requirements, i.e.:

| College Course | High School Equivalent |

| ENGL 131, 132,245 and 331 | English III and IV |
| PE 120 (Total Wellness) and PE activity elective | Healthful Living |
| Elementary Spanish I and II, French I and II or <br> Chinese I and II | World Language Requirement |

## RISING JUNIOR AND SENIOR REGISTRATION

- High school courses typically meet everyday.
- College courses meet either MWF for one hour each day or TR for one and a half hours each day. Leadership Seminar/FYE: Continuing GLC on SAU campus.
- American History options: Advanced Placement (AP) or Honors
- A typical junior takes 2 high school courses (American History and Leadership Seminar) and 3 college courses in her first semester. Refer to sample junior and senior schedules in registration guide.
- Drop/Add Period: First 10 school days of each semester for both high school and college courses. Dropping and adding courses requires parent consent.
- Fifth Year Decisions: We will work with students and parents to make a decision about staying for a fifth year by the end of junior year. This will have implications for college applications and creating a standardized testing schedule.


## FINAL THOUGHTS

- High school elective choices will be based on student interest.
- All courses are subject to change as we continue to build a curriculum and course of study that best prepares our students for their early college experience.
- After students enter course selections into their Power School accounts, counselors will print course verification sheets for parents to view and sign.
